



Lulu's furniture & décor supports 3 local community causes

May 2009 – With a strong belief that it's crucial to support and participate in our community, lulu's furniture & décor recently contributed to and sponsored three local programs.

During February and March, lulu's held a special "chair-ity" promotion, where a portion of each sale of a Rowe Furniture chair was tagged for The Delores Project. Customers who participated in this promotion helped us raise \$100 for [The Delores Project](#), a Denver nonprofit that provides safe, comfortable overnight shelter and services to adult women who are homeless and have limited resources.

In April, lulu's furniture & décor held a "dog days" sale with a focus on animal-themed items (lulu's has items featuring dogs, cats, hens, pigs, penguins and more) to help raise money for the Denver [Dumb Friends League](#). More than \$75 was generated to be shared with this worthy nonprofit dedicated to the health and welfare of animals.

And throughout April and early May, lulu's helped sell tickets for the 5th Annual [University Park Home Tour](#). All tour proceeds enable the University Park PTA to financially contribute to important programs at the school, ensuring that our children receive the high-quality education that they deserve.

"These programs made it even more gratifying and fun to help our customers find just the right items for the right price at lulu's."

Throughout the year, Brant also ensures her store helps Coloradoans by providing a sales outlet for local jewelry makers, local painters and local furniture builders. Many items in the store also are sourced from family-owned firms. She also is a member of the [Mile High Business Alliance](#), which works to support locally owned and independently operated businesses, and a Participant in [The 3/50 Project](#), which encourages people to spend just \$50 total at three local stores each month to ensure local economies thrive.
